Global issues /local impact

- Migration
- Economic transition/depletion of natural resources
- Poor health outcomes
- Conflict in neighbourhood
- High unemployment/low family income/access to learning
- Chronic illnesses, poor health literacy, unhealthy behaviour



THE GAP

What does this mean and what is its significance?

Outcomes are related to differences **WITHIN** a country, not **BETWEEN** countries.

Community Schools

- an essential mechanism to tackle the issues at local level
 - Collaborative leadership
 - Partners with parents
 - Social inclusion and extension of access
 - Relevant curriculum
 - Open school climate
 - Services delivered in partnership e.g. Health services, public health promotions services, safety of children, inter-cultural understanding – lifelong learning
- ***'Schools alone cannot break the link between disadvantage and achievement ... research stresses the need for holistic and broad based approaches that involve a number of agencies working together to address community based issues.'***
(Estyn Report: Tackling child poverty and disadvantage in schools, January 2010)



Examples of how they work

- **Ministry of Education and Sport, Slovenia**
- *Šoštanj Primary School offers a learning process which can enrich traditional forms of schooling. It demonstrates how a school, including its infrastructure, can influence family life and the environment, creating new social patterns and a local identity. Pupils and teachers are involved in different thematic projects and programmes, together with parents and the wider community.*
